#### What drama studies degrees are there?

Drama Studies and a Language (one from French, Italian or Spanish) Drama Studies and English Drama Studies and Film Studies

#### What A levels/IB scores do I need?

(For other qualifications information, refer to pages 125-129)

Typical A level offer range: AAB-ABB

For Drama Studies and English, A levels (or equivalent) must include English, English Literature or the combined A level in English Language and Literature at grade A

For Drama Studies and a Language, A levels (or equivalent) must include the language you wish to study at grade B

Typical IB diploma offer range: 34-36 points

For Drama Studies and English, 34-36 points including 6 in Higher Level English

For Drama Studies and a Language, 34-36 points normally including your chosen language at Higher Level with a final grade of 5

### **English language requirements**

IELTS 6.5 overall and not less than 6.0 in both the Listening and Writing sections. Internet-based TOEFL with 90 overall, including at least 24 in Speaking and 25 in Writing. For alternative English language requirements, refer to page 130

#### Why drama studies?

Studying drama equips you with a broad range of skills, both practical and theoretical, that are transferable in a variety of cultural spheres and contexts.

#### Why drama studies at Sussex?

- Drama studies at Sussex is ranked in the top 10 in the UK in *The Complete University Guide* 2010-11.
- In the 2008 Research Assessment Exercise (RAE)
   95 per cent of our drama research was rated as recognised internationally or higher, and over half rated as internationally excellent or higher.
- Throughout your degree, you will explore a range of ideas, issues and questions relating to theatre and performance, in particular how such practices relate to different social, political, aesthetic and cultural arenas. You will address these through a rigorous combination of theory and practice, and thus develop confidence and ability both as a creative practitioner and thinker.
- Specialist teaching from active practitioners and researchers in specific historical periods, as well as in international contemporary theatre practices and performance.
- Our curriculum explores the relationship between theory and practice in the seminar room, in studio workshops and with professional visiting artists and practitioners.
- Programme of study that moves from the introduction of first principles, via their more sophisticated application, to areas of research-led individual specialism.
- Strong relationships with local and national arts organisations (including the Brighton International Festival), and opportunities to work with these during your degree. We encourage you to gain valuable professional experience and thus develop your career prospects.
- Emphasis on group work and collaboration in teaching and assessment.
- Major performance projects (Years 2 and 3) to professional standard and for an invited public.

#### What sort of career could I have?

- theatre and performing arts including directing, performing, producing, developing educational programmes, and arts administration
- media, film and journalistic professions
- further study at professional conservatoires and drama schools or in higher education (Masters, PhD)
- teaching
- other professions (law, accountancy) for which a good degree is necessary and where excellent communication skills are required.

Drama studies at Sussex develops your intellectual understanding of the role and function of drama in society by considering a wide range of performance practices and contexts. You develop a practical awareness – gained through exercises in writing, acting and performance – of how drama can be conceived and applied

#### How will I learn?

You learn through a combination of seminars and practical workshops that often examine theoretical concepts, topics and methods you are researching. Some courses are taught through seminar only. You also spend sustained periods in the studio, rehearsing and preparing performance projects.

Your work is assessed by various means including seminar presentations, essays and longer dissertations, which train you in the academic disciplines of close reading and analysis, researching, writing, logical thought, critical evaluation of ideas, articulation of complex concepts, succinct expression, and meticulous verbal presentation. There is also scope within the degree to produce your own creative writing alongside development of specialist practical skills (eg devising, lighting, design, directing). Your practical work is assessed through performance, group work, and critical reflective essays.

#### What will I achieve?

- a detailed knowledge of the development of theatre from the Greeks to the present day
- exploration of practical and performative concepts in drama, staging and the writing of texts
- an understanding of theatre as a social construct and as a major form of communication. Its gestures, costumes, music and voices are constructions that provide rich sources of information on the way culture and society have developed
- intellectual understanding of the role of drama within society, as well as practical awareness – gained through exercises in writing, acting and performance – of how drama is enacted
- by studying drama alongside other related subjects such as film, English or a language, you are able to make interdisciplinary connections
- a wide range of skills relating to data analysis, research, bibliographic construction, presentation and articulation
- if the degree includes a language, the ability to speak and write the language to a high level, and to read dramatic texts in their original language.

#### **Degrees**

#### Drama Studies and a Language (one from French, Italian or Spanish) BA (Hons), 4 years UCAS Code: W4RX

This degree combines drama and language studies, and offers the opportunity to acquire a foreign language and historical, dramatic and cultural knowledge in an integrated fashion. The degree allows you to develop language skills while spending a year at a university in a country where your chosen language is spoken.

Alongside your drama courses, you focus on a language in combination with courses on the culture of the country in which it is spoken, or of Europe generally.

#### Drama Studies and English BA (Hons), 3 years UCAS Code: WQ43

This degree is for students who are keen to focus upon drama in a wider literary context. The combination enables you to pursue drama both in relation to other literary genres such as the novel, poetry and non-fiction prose, and in relation to a wide spectrum of theoretical approaches to literature and culture.

The programme encourages the study of dramatic texts not simply as literature, but also as the basis for performance. From the Greeks to the present day, drama is taught in a variety of ways. You explore practical and performative concepts in the staging and writing of texts, in particular historical and cultural contexts. Drama core courses such as Writing for the Theatre, and English courses including a wide range of core courses and options, provide complementary fields of study that enrich your understanding of both subjects.

## Drama Studies and Film Studies BA (Hons), 3 years UCAS Code: WP43

This degree provides an approach that integrates two ways of presenting cultural narratives and explorations; film and dramatic performance. The film studies element of the programme offers a firm foundation in visual literacy, film genres and film theory by introducing you to a wide range of film-making and viewing across the globe.

As well as the drama studies core courses, first-year courses include Film Analysis, and Issues in Film Studies.

In Year 2 you look at issues of film theory and film genres in greater depth, before moving on to explore a range of cinematic practices.

In the final year, you take two thematic options from a range of film studies courses and complete a film studies dissertation.

You take all the drama studies core courses for the full three years, alongside film studies core courses.
