
The Sussex graduate – making the future

For employers, it's not so much what you know, but what you can do with your knowledge that counts. The experience and skills you'll acquire here beyond your studies will make you an attractive prospect. Initiatives such as Sussex Plus, together with the Careers and Employability Centre, are here to help you turn your skills to your career advantage. It's good to know that six months after graduating 85 per cent of 2009 Sussex graduates were working, studying, or both.

Sussex Plus and Skillclouds

Key facts

In addition to academic qualifications, employers increasingly look for wider life skills such as leadership, personal initiative and team working. Sussex Plus and Skillclouds are two complementary initiatives for undergraduates:

- Sussex Plus encourages you to develop your skills by getting involved in extracurricular activities. It enables you to reflect on your experiences and document what you've learned in an attractive multimedia webfolio – like an online CV but with so much more
- Skillclouds provides personalised information about the skills gained through your degree programme, and can be used as a resource in the development of your Sussex Plus webfolio.

Taking part in Sussex Plus enables you to bring together evidence of your academic achievements, part-time work, volunteering, student development activities and life experience. You will have the opportunity to:

- develop a range of life skills through employability skills events
- enhance and hone your skills by volunteering in schools, contributing to community projects through Project V (refer to page 14), taking part in the Learning to Lead programme (a 10-day intensive leadership programme with affiliation to the Institute of Leadership and Management), or being active in student media, and
- enrich your learning experience and help manage your personal and career development.

Your career and employability plan

First-year students

Get involved in student clubs, write for the student press and volunteer in the community through Project V. Explore part-time work options with the Careers and Employability Centre, attend employer dropins and develop your CV-based webfolio. Talk to a careers advisor about vacation work. Try to show how resourceful you are.

Second-year students

Clarify your career ideas with a Careers and Employability Centre advisor. Attend campus recruitment fairs, employer talks and career development workshops to explore your options. Bolster your CV through student development activities.

Think about how you can make the most of summer work in the UK or abroad. Talk through your ideas with a careers advisor.

Spend time each week moving your plans forward. Attend employer talks, Gradfair and Lawfair. Attend Careers and Employability Centre workshops to learn how to make your applications stand out and feel confident about interviews, employer selection tests and assessment centres. Many employers, and study and training providers, have deadlines early in the year (some before Christmas) so don't miss out.

Junior Research Associate bursary scheme

The pioneering Junior Research Associate bursary enables talented and ambitious undergraduates interested in pursuing an academic career after graduation to experience a taste of life as a researcher during the summer months. Students are supervised by some of the University's top researchers in subject areas as diverse as literature, quantum physics and biology. In 2010, 25 students received £1,800 each to support them in their work.

Student Associate Scheme

This Scheme gives students in Higher Education the opportunity to work alongside teachers in schools, gain knowledge and experience about teaching, and to explore teaching as a career while still studying for their degree.
