

Durham University's School of Government and International Affairs combines a long tradition of expertise in a wide range of fields in politics, political theory, political economy, security and peace studies, faith and globalisation and international relations with a depth of specialisms in regional expertise – Europe, East Asia, the Middle East and wider Muslim world.

ABOUT THE SCHOOL

The School's place amongst the top UK departments for Politics and International Relations has been confirmed by the 2008 Research Assessment Exercise (RAE) results in which 50% of our research rated in the top two categories: 'world leading' and 'internationally excellent'.

The School submitted work by every member of its academic staff to the RAE, with the results showing research excellence throughout the School. With a further 30% of research rated 'internationally recognised', 80% of the School's research output falls in the top three grades of the exercise. learning, training and research, the School has a truly international base with students from over 40 different countries studying on both our taught and research courses. The School prides itself on the support it provides for postgraduate students and has dedicated IT and study room facilities. Special collection library facilities are located within the main University Library, which is a short walk from the School.

TAUGHT PROGRAMMES MA in Faith and Globalisation

This interdisciplinary programme is intended to provide rigorous, researchdriven knowledge and understanding of the interrelations of faith/religion and globalisation. Starting from an agendasetting module, students will be able to explore such interconnections deeper and across different approaches and topics, choosing modules from various departments in the humanities and social sciences. Political, economic, legal, and ethical issues that have emerged as religious actors become part of global processes, are addressed through questions of identity, freedom, rights, (economic and social) justice, peace, science and technology, sustainability, among others. Reflection is also stimulated on how knowledge and social practices construct the different actors, and how the normative claims of each party either allow for or refuse dialogical engagements.

MSc in Arab World Studies

This programme is intended to provide rigorous, research-driven, interdisciplinary education and training. Students are able to develop skills and knowledge sufficient for the conduct of research in and on the Arab World to develop an understanding of generic training in research methods and methodologies to provide a foundation for subject specific training in research methods and methodologies. The programme also provides language instruction in the Arab language so that students are able to develop appropriate and sufficient competence to utilise the language in their subsequent research, or employment in the Arabspeaking world.

The International Relations programmes provide you with the systematic knowledge and intellectual tools to critically review developments in the theory and practice of international relations. They enable you to evaluate in a sophisticated and critical fashion concepts, theories and paradigms within the broad field if international relations, drawing lessons from empirical studies involving both quantitative and qualitative investigations. Students are able to develop their ability to deploy research strategies and methods in an appropriately advanced fashion to critically evaluate current research and advanced scholarship. Each study route aims to provide advanced knowledge and understanding of the dynamics, including cultural and local political and ideological factors, which shape the contemporary international relations of the area.

The programmes also provide an opportunity for studying international relations and in comparative and historical perspective taking account of regional specific political and economic factors.

MSc in Defence, Development and Diplomacy

With conflicts becoming increasingly drawn-out, asymmetric wars of attrition, our understanding of conflict and conflict intervention is undergoing a seismic shift. Conflicts will be determined not by military victory, diplomacy or long-term development alone, but by securing populations through a comprehensive approach that sees to their political, and economic, as well as their security-related needs.

Their outcome will be determined by how well the different arms of government and civil society, both locally and internationally, can work together and how well they understand each others' perspectives.

This inter-disciplinary and customdesigned MA offers the unique opportunity to look at conflict, conflict intervention and post-conflict reconstruction through the lenses of defence, development and diplomacy.



The MA is designed for graduates with a career in government, the armed forces, inter-governmental organisations, NGOs or academia in mind, and for practitioners looking to enhance their practical skills while placing these within a broader theoretical perspective.

MA in Conflict Prevention, Sustainable Peace and Security

The MA will provide students with advanced knowledge of the complex and specialised areas of conflict prevention, conflict resolution, conflict transformation, conflict analysis, state stabilisation, peace processes, humanitarian intervention and peace building within the context of contemporary conflict and international humanitarian intervention. Integrated into the MA structure are opportunities to develop operational and vocational skills important for peace and conflict mediation and negotiation. This provides students with knowledge and skills that are helpful for current and future employment opportunities, thus being attractive to both graduates and mid-career practitioners. Whilst the academic and applied focus of the MA comes through a peace and conflict studies analytic lens, course material will also draw from traditional strategic and security studies, enabling crossfertilisation between these different perspectives so that new paradigms in the fields of conflict, peace, security, defence, diplomacy, development and humanitarian intervention can be explored.

MA in Research Methods (International Relations)

This degree is offered in collaboration with other departments in the Faculty of Social Sciences and Health and is designed to provide a strong all-round training in research methods allied to further specialisation within the field of politics and international relations/studies.

It is assumed that in taking this MA, you do so with the intention of proceeding to a PhD in Politics or International Relations. It has received official recognition from the Economic and Social Research Council (ESRC) and eligible candidates can apply for (ESRC) (1+3) studentships. The programme includes compulsory elements in a wide variety of techniques including statistics and quantitative methods, but contains less subject-specific content than the other MA courses.

Designated and networked research work space is available within the SGIA buildings. The research findings of PhD students often result in published output. You will have access to the excellent IT facilities of the Al-Qasimi building and all the specialist library collections in Durham. Language tuition is available as required and the School provides financial support for research students for printing and photocopying, as well as for conference attendance.
