A Liberal Education at Brandon University

The liberal arts have always been at the centre of the BU experience. In practical terms, this means that a liberal education is one that teaches you how to communicate, employ effective interpersonal skills, adapt to change, apply critical and analytical thinking, and problem-solve. Liberal education graduates are predisposed to

anticipate, expect, and even search for, different ways of doing things: the really valuable and enduring talents for those entering the modern economy.

At BU, we prefer to talk about the "liberal arts and sciences" to avoid confusion with the Faculty of Arts. The curriculum of most courses is liberal, but Brandon University is special because a liberal arts and science approach to education touches every degree we offer at the program level. If you study English, you will have to take some science classes; if you study chemistry, you will need to complete a few courses from non-science departments. Even our professionally oriented programmes such as Applied Disaster and Emergency Studies, Business Administration, Environmental Science, and Indigenous Health and Human Services have a strong liberal studies component.

This kind of broad learning prepares our graduates for satisfying and well-paid employment in the new knowledge economy. People who are able to critically assess problems, formulate solutions, and lead others through change are sought after by employers in every business sector.



Brandon is a dynamic community serving a rich agricultural and farming region—that is why it is called "The Wheat City." Brandon is a very beautiful city, dotted with parks, many along the Assiniboine River that winds its way through the valley. The city offers a wide variety of indoor and outdoor recreational activities for all seasons. Brandon is a city of just the right proportion: big enough to offer all the benefits of city life, but small enough to remain warm and friendly. Whether you live on-campus or off-campus, the community of Brandon offers you a varied and exciting life outside of class time.

Brandon delivers excellent social, cultural and sporting opportunities - many available at Brandon University itself. The Centennial Auditorium is located on the campus. Brandon has film, folk and jazz festivals. There are art galleries and museums such as the Commonwealth Air Training Plan Museum at the Brandon Airport.

The River Bank Discovery Centre lies at the heart of the Assiniboine River Corridor through Brandon.

The Centre is an excellent point from which to access an extensive trail system, interpretive ponds and natural prairie habitat. In addition to natural trails, Brandon boasts many kilometers of paved biking/walking paths. Cross-country skiing and hiking trails are found in the city and the adjacent Brandon Hills.

Accommodations

University Residence

There is much more to residence than convenience and economy. It is also an incredible opportunity to meet hundreds of new people, participate in many new activities, develop new skills, and experience new things. You can do all this while enjoying campus life.



Brandon University has three residences, and each offers double and single occupancy rooms. Facilities in each residence include games rooms, television lounges, multi-purpose rooms, study rooms and laundry facilities. In addition to the BU gymnasium and the School of Music's more than 20 practice rooms, residence students have access to two dedicated fitness centres and a music practice room.

Each residence room (approximately 175 square feet) includes all the furniture you will need including beds, dressers, desks, bookshelves, chairs and night tables. We also include bed linen, pillows and a blanket. Rooms have a telephone jack, lamps, and are wired for cable television. McMaster and Flora Cowan Hall rooms are wired for internet access through the University's network or through local service providers. Darrach Hall rooms are not wired for the University's service, however, internet is available through local service providers.

Food Services



BA Bachelor of **Arts**

Students may complete Arts degrees at Brandon University in the Humanities, Social Sciences, Fine and Creative Arts, Business Administration and Applied Disaster and Emergency Studies. The Faculty of Arts is also home to two professional degree programs - the Bachelor of Business Administration and the Bachelor of Fine Arts. Our faculty members are active researchers, writers, performers and artists. Their successes in their disciplines translate into unique and lively classroom experiences. Because we have small class sizes, students often have an opportunity to participate directly in original research and to share an experience reserved for graduate-level study at other universities. The Arts Faculty

is located in the historic Clark Hall-Original Building, restored to provide a very attractive and technologically advanced learning environment.

Arts degrees provide the foundational skills that are in constant demand by employers everywhere. Many of our graduates go on to additional professional studies in such fields as law, education, and accounting, or on to master's programs.




BSc Bachelor of **Science**

A student pursuing a BSc at Brandon University has an opportunity to study in a small class setting with instructors well known for their teaching abilities. Students are able to interact with their professors. both in the classroom and outside, for an unsurpassed educational experience. Our faculty members are also renowned worldwide for their research, providing opportunities for students to understand and participate in research activities. Thus, students can enhance their research skills and expertise in the use of sophisticated analytical equipment in classrooms and laboratories.

While you have considerable freedom to choose your first-year courses, regulations are in place to make sure you get a balanced liberal education. You are encouraged to seek advice from the advising staff in Student Services and the faculty members in the subject area you are interested in. They will help you to make informed decisions about your course of study.

At Brandon University, two of the social sciences (Geography and Psychology) are included with the more traditional natural sciences within the Faculty of Science. This combination provides a unique perspective for students and faculty – one that highlights that people are an integral part of science. The liberal education at the foundation of the study of science is important because the advances made in the realms of science are having an enormous



impact on the world, and future advances promise to change our lives even more.

BEd Bachelor of **Education**

Bachelor of Education— BEd (After Degree), BMus/BEd (After Degree)

Brandon University's Faculty of Education has a long and distinguished history of preparing teachers for Manitoba schools. The Faculty prepares teachers for early years (Kindergarten-Grade 4), middle years (Grade 5-Grade 8), and Senior Years (Grades 9-12).



Bachelor of Education (5-Year Integrated)

As a high school student, if you already know you would like to become an early or middle-years teacher, you can apply to the Bachelor of Education (5-Year Integrated) degree.

Bachelor of Education (AD-After Degree)

If you already have or are getting an undergraduate degree, like a BA or BSc, you can apply to be certified as a teacher through our After Degree program which takes two years and 60 credit hours of coursework.

Bachelor of Music / Bachelor of Education (Concurrent)

If you would like to teach music, you will need a Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Education, which is a five-year concurrent program jointly offered with the School of Music.

As part of your teacher preparation, you will spend about 25 weeks in classrooms practicing the art of teaching and learning about your own strengths as a teacher.

Community-Based Teacher Education

The Faculty of Education also offers the Bachelor of Education (5-Year Integrated) program through community-based programs. This option, where it is available, offers students the opportunity to become teachers while studying in their own communities. BFA Bachelor of Fine Arts

The Bachelor of Fine Arts is a professional studio-based program offering four-year majors and minors and an Honors program. Students entering the program with advanced standing may be able to complete the program in three years. Majors include Painting, Ceramics, Aboriginal Art and Drawing. A major in Digital Media and Design is available in collaboration with Assiniboine Community College. Minors include Art and Visual Culture, Painting, Ceramics, Aboriginal Art and Drawing.

The Bachelor of Fine Arts includes studio courses in art practice, art

and visual culture lecture classes and at least one business course. The studio programs foster an informed, independent, professional studio practice in the majors listed above. Students are encouraged to immerse themselves in a wide spectrum of creative directions and opportunities while acquiring essential skills for professional activity in their chosen fields such as Multi-Media and Printmaking. Ceramic majors have the opportunity to hand-build, wheelthrow, and create clay sculpture in a new state-of-the-art ceramic studio. For non-practicing artists, the field of

Art and Visual Culture opens the way to understanding and appreciating visual expressions from many different cultures and time periods.

The department and the Brandon University Fine Art Student Association (BUFASA) are partners in the exhibition programming for the Glen P. Sutherland Gallery of Art where student artworks are juried for presentation to the public. Students assist in all aspects of planning and mounting exhibitions in preparation for their thesis exhibitions and arts careers beyond the BFA.

BMus Bachelor of **Music**, BMus/BEd (Concurrent)

Brandon University has a long and distinguished history as a leader in post-secondary musical education. The School of Music maintains an exceptionally low student/teacher ratio and prides itself on the personalized instruction it provides to its students.

The Queen Elizabeth II Music Building is one of the finest facilities of its kind. It houses teaching studios, practice studios, the Lorne Watson Recital Hall, Music Library, Music Technology Lab, Electronic Music Studio, Media Room and many rehearsal halls and classrooms.

The School of Music offers five undergraduate degrees:

Bachelor of Music (Honours)

is our most flexible program. In conjunction with a faculty advisor, this four-year degree is tailored to the needs of each individual student. Many students who plan to do graduate study in such areas as musicology, music theory, or music therapy select this program.

Bachelor of Music (Performance) is offered in all

orchestral instruments, as well as piano, organ, voice and guitar. Students are prepared for careers as professional performers or private teachers.

Admission to this program is by audition at the end of first year.

Bachelor of Music (Performance – Jazz Studies) is

offered in such areas as saxophone, guitar, bass guitar, voice and drum set. Two large jazz ensembles, small groups, jazz history and literature courses round out this intensive jazz program. Admission to the program is by audition at the end of first year.

Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Education is offered as a five year concurrent program with the Faculty of Education. The program prepares you to become a certified music teacher and graduates receive a Manitoba Permanent Teacher's Certificate.

Bachelor of Music (Specialist in **School Music)** is a four-year degree program with an emphasis in school music and is available to

students who wish to pursue a BEd after completion of the BMus degree. Graduates of the BEd program, which involves two years of study after completion of the BMus, receive a Manitoba Permanent Teacher's Certificate.





BBA Bachelor of **Business Administration**

The BBA program aims to:

- foster critical thinking and strengthen written and oral communication skills;
- prepare students for careers in business administration, management, or entrepreneurship; and
- prepare students for further study in business and management.

The Bachelor of Business Administration program is built on a foundation of the courses in the core areas of business including accounting, information management, marketing management, human resources, finance, operations management and productions and operations. The small business management course requires students to integrate their knowledge through the preparation of a comprehensive business plan and a consulting project with local businesses. Students interested in obtaining a professional designation in accounting are able to complete the required courses as electives within the BBA. BBA students complement their

business administration studies with a non-business minor, plus courses in the humanities and natural sciences.

Our program provides advanced standing to students who have completed a 2-year college diploma in business administration from a Manitoba college. Students must have attained at least a "B" average and have earned their diploma within the previous five years. Students with diplomas from other colleges are evaluated for admission on an individual basis.

BPES Bachelor of **Physical Education Studies**

The Bachelor of Physical Education Studies is a 3-year undergraduate degree. The BPES provides students with in-depth knowledge of the field of physical education and with the fundamental and specialized skills required by physical educators.



BSCESBachelor of Science in **Environmental Science**

Environmental Science is the study of the interaction between plants, animals and the environment, and human impacts on these systems. This 4-year, interdisciplinary program provides the scientific background necessary to address environmental issues such as pollution, climate change, resource management, and the conservation of wildlife and their habitats. This degree offers a wide range of career opportunities, with the environment sector seeing rapid employment growth across Canada.

Students select one of three streams of specialization: Biodiversity, Physical Sciences, Resource Management.

The program includes courses offered by each of the departments in the Faculty of Science, as well as courses from the Faculty of Arts such as Environmental Ethics.

Special features

All students complete a final year project in preparation for professional practice.

A transfer of 2-years credit is available to students who have completed Assiniboine Community College's Environmental Technologies - Land and Water Management Diploma.

This program continues Brandon University's long tradition of partnership with Indigenous communities in the development and implementation of post-secondary educational opportunities of high quality.




BN Bachelor of **Nursing**

Applicants who meet the general admission requirements of Brandon University will be considered for acceptance into the Pre-Nursing Year. Upon successful completion of the required Pre-Nursing courses, students are eligible to apply to Year 2 of the BN program.

This professional program prepares graduates to work in a variety of settings with individuals, families and communities to promote, maintain and strengthen health.

Opportunities for careers in nursing are numerous and diverse. Graduates will be able to choose employment opportunities in hospital/community settings, educational institutions or administrative areas. BN graduates will be eligible to write the qualifying examination for licensure as a Registered Nurse with the College of Registered Nurses of Manitoba.



BScPNBachelor of Science **Psychiatric Nursing**

Applicants who meet the general admission requirements of Brandon University will be considered for acceptance into the Pre-Psychiatric Nursing Year. Upon successful completion of the required Pre-Psychiatric Nursing courses, students are eligible to apply to Year 2 of the BScPN program.

This professional program prepares psychiatric nursing graduates to work in a variety of settings with individuals, families and communities.

Psychiatric Nursing is concerned with the health, especially the mental health, of individuals, families, groups and communities. Psychiatric nurses engage in therapeutic interactions with people to promote, maintain and restore health. They are concerned with those affected by psychiatric illness and developmental challenges, and with the influence of society on the mental health of people.

Graduates of the program will be eligible to write the qualifying examinations for licensure as a Registered Psychiatric Nurse with the College of Registered Psychiatric Nurses of Manitoba.

The Winnipeg Option

Brandon University, in collaboration with the University of Winnipeg, offers our four-year BScPN program in Winnipeg.

BScMHPost-Diploma Program in **Mental Health**

A program for Registered Psychiatric Nurses recognizes previous education and work experience leading to a bachelor's qualification in mental health/developmental habilitation.

Pre-professional Studies

To gain admission to many preprofessional programs you must first complete one or more years of university study. One of our specialties is pre-professional programs: a selection of arts and science courses that qualify you for admission to a professional program such as medicine or social work at another university. We offer some professional programs of our own, but our focus on undergraduate education means that you can gain a great pre-professional education here.

Graduate Studies

Master of Education and Graduate Diploma in Education

The Faculty of Education's Department of Graduate Studies and Field Research has more than two hundred students. The Master of Education degree helps develop new skills and leadership abilities, and is available in both a 36 and 54 credit-hour program. The areas of concentration are: Curriculum and Instruction, Educational Administration, Guidance and Counselling, and Special Education. The programs offer either a research route through a project or thesis, or a coursework only route.

The Graduate Diploma in Education program is 30 credit hours in length and serves either as a terminal program for special education teacher certification programs, or it can be used as entrance to either of the two Master of Education programs. All graduate level programs in the Faculty of Education encourage research-related activities for students by providing professional and financial support.

Master of Music-MMus

The Master of Music Degree is available with a major in Performance and Literature and in Music Education.

Master of Music (Music Education)

This program offers teachers the opportunity for advanced study with practical emphasis in elementary music, choral music, or instrumental music. The program requires 24 credit hours of course work followed by a Master's Thesis or 24 credit hours of course work followed by a Comprehensive Examination or 30 credit hours of course work followed by a Research Project.

Master of Music (Performance and Literature)

This program is offered in piano, collaborative piano, composition, strings, clarinet, and choral/instrumental conducting. It is intended to further a student's professional expertise in



performance or composition, with additional emphasis on pedagogical practices. The program requires 30 hours of course work.

Master of Rural Development/ Graduate Diploma in Rural Development—MRD/GradDipRD)

The Master of Rural Development degree provides you with:

- Knowledge of current development theory
- The ability to apply knowledge in your selected area of interest
- Skills in understanding and participating in rural governance
- Technical skills in research design and reporting
- Basic training in community relations, networking, group facilitation and development planning
- An understanding of the formulation and role of policy in rural development
- Knowledge of the structure and functioning of rural society

The Graduate Diploma in Rural Development is designed to provide graduate-level study to those who wish to extend their knowledge of theory and practice through course work, but are not interested in the research-training component of graduate study.

Master of Psychiatric Nursing – MPN

This new graduate program is designed for students who are seeking advanced practice roles in psychiatric nursing. Foundational courses in advanced practice are complemented by a focus on a selected stream. Streams are offered in advanced clinical practice, administration and education. The streams are supported by research courses which, when combined with content from the selected stream, enable graduates to evaluate current practice and contribute to innovation in service delivery. Graduates are prepared to be leaders in psychiatric nursing and health care. Graduates are also prepared to undertake doctoral study.

Anthropology (BA)



Anthropology is the study of people, and there are four sub-fields in this discipline.

- 1. Physical Anthropology is the study of the origin and evolution of our species.
- Archaeology is the study of ancient life styles and cultures through the exploration and examination of prehistoric artifacts.
- Cultural Anthropology is the study of the description and analysis of past and present societies.
- 4. Linguistics is the study of language.


The program in anthropology has four main objectives: to teach introductory courses spanning all four sub-fields of anthropology, to offer

general interest courses useful as part of a liberal arts education, to provide service courses where applicable and to provide a strong academic foundation for students proceeding to graduate studies. Many disciplines have an interest in anthropology and therefore some of the available courses are taught through other departments such as: Human Origins and Linguistics (Native Studies), and the Anthropology of Religion (Religion).

Applied Disaster & Emergency Studies (BA or BSc)



This program introduces students to a broad range of technological and environmental risks with an emphasis on how social and physical factors interact in disasters. Graduates of the program are able to assist with all aspects of emergency management, including traditional preparedness and response activities as well as recovery efforts to help people affected by disasters get their lives back to normal, and mitigation planning to prevent future damages. Applied Disaster and Emergency Studies adopts a liberal arts and sciences approach to foster an appreciation for the interdisciplinary nature of the field. The ADES curriculum balances theory and practice as well as the social and physical science perspectives. A minor is also available to complement any BA or BSc major.

Biology (BSc)

Biology at Brandon University explores all facets of the study of life on Earth. Students are introduced to the study of biomolecules, evolution, and biodiversity in their first year. In subsequent years, emphasis is placed on cell and developmental biology, ecology, evolution, genetics, physiology, systematics, and the in-depth study of animals, fungi, plants and prokaryotes.

Our students tailor their programs to reflect their interests in Biology by selecting one of two streams. The Biology Stream is intended for students who are preparing for careers as laboratory or clinical technologists or who wish to pursue graduate studies in biology. The Biomedical Stream satisfies the entrance requirements of medical, veterinary and allied health professional schools. This stream is also intended for students interested in pursuing graduate studies in biomedical research. Both streams are suitable for students entering the after-degree Bachelor of Education program.

The Biology Department has a reputation for producing competitive, high-caliber students who earn post-graduate degrees at prestigious Canadian and U.S. universities. After two or three years in a Biology program, our students qualify to apply for admission to professional schools to

pursue careers in dentistry, medicine, optometry, and veterinary medicine.

Our courses in biodiversity and ecology feature fieldwork experiences that capitalize on local and regional habitats (i.e., sand dunes, mixed-grass prairie, deciduous and boreal forests, lakes, rivers, and wetlands).

Students interested in agriculture can complete courses offered through the Biology Department and other departments at Brandon University that are accepted as the first one or two years of the University of Manitoba's BSc programs in Agriculture, Agro-ecology, Agribusiness or Food Science.



Business Administration (BBA or BA)

Students interested in majoring in business may complete a 4 year Bachelor of Business Administration, or a 3 or 4 year Bachelor of Arts with a major in Business. The program provides students with a strong foundation in the major functional areas of business, including accounting, finance, management, human resources, marketing, information management, and operations management.

The department offers a comprehensive range of advanced elective courses in accounting, allowing students to fully prepare for a career as a C.A., C.M.A. or C.G.A.

Students are required to have Grade 12 Precalculus or Applied Math in order to take statistics. Students without Grade 11 Accounting must complete 16:090, Introduction to Bookkeeping.

Students who have completed a two-year business diploma at a recognized college may be eligible for a 60 credit hour advanced standing towards a 4 year business degree.

Chemistry (BSc)

Chemistry deals with the nature of and changes in matter, which is why there are few sciences that do not involve chemistry.

Chemists study the nature of atoms, how atoms combine to produce molecules, and the properties of these molecules and how they react to produce new substances. Many of the comforts and conveniences we enjoy today are the result of the effective use of chemical knowledge. Think about fuels, plastics, food additives and drugs—these are only a few of the chemical products we use daily. While yielding many benefits to our society, chemistry has also been at the forefront of controversy, such as with pollution, global warming and chemical warfare. The Chemistry Department attempts to convey

to students some of the limitations of present knowledge and the need for further research.

Computer Science (BSc)

Computer technology is growing rapidly and affecting our lives in many different ways. The computer is a powerful tool for storing, retrieving, manipulating and presenting data. A special by-product of studying computer science is the learning and developing of an ability to solve the problems that are important in today's changing world.

In first year computer science, you will learn the Java programming language. The course is designed to challenge people who are fond of computers and mathematics, and possess the ability to think logically. Students with these interests or abilities will find computer science courses fascinating. In "Introduction to Information Technology," you will learn to use software development languages and software productivity packages. Emphasis is placed on developing the ability to examine a problem, discover a solution and then implement that solution.

Geography (BA or BSc)



If you are interested in the relationships between the environment and society and want to learn about landscapes and people, consider studying geography. Geography is about place and space. It studies the interdependence among regions, natural systems, physical features, society, and cultural activities. Using a "spatial" perspective, it aims to form a coherent understanding of Earth. Geographers explore answers to questions like: Where are things or people located on the surface of the earth? Why are they located there? What processes are at work in developing those regions or features?

People with geography skills apply what they know successfully in a wide variety of fields. Our recent grads have embarked on careers in urban and regional land use planning, conservation and resource management, mapping, geographic information systems and remote sensing, parks and recreation, teaching and research.

Students have an opportunity to gain hands-on experience through a practicum course, which

applied academic training in geography to a project on or off campus. Others work closely with faculty to pursue their interests in a specific field of geography in a Directed Studies or Undergraduate Thesis course.

Special Features

The department hosts the Centre for Geomatics, which is a dedicated computer lab with facilities for geographic information systems (GIS), remote sensing and cartography. Practical training in this field significantly increases your employment marketability upon graduation.

Brandon University and Minot State University, Bottineau, North Dakota, offer a formal link between Brandon's geography program and MSU's water quality program. The arrangement allows you to earn credit at each campus towards a BSc from Brandon University and a Diploma in Water Quality Technology from Minot State University.

Geology (BSc)



Geology is the study of the planet Earth. It is concerned with the origins of our planet, the evolution of life, the materials and morphology of the Earth and its history. It deals with the processes that shape the present landscape and those that acted throughout geologic time. The Earth is a naturally occurring physical-chemical system; hence geology draws on other sciences such as chemistry, physics, biology, mathematics and geography. The modern geologist is a well-rounded scientist.

Geology is a practical science—geologic knowledge is applied in the search for, and sustainable development of, Earth's mineral and energy resources, and the evaluation of groundwater resources and environmental concerns. The Earth is dynamic and geoscientists study and predict earthquakes, volcanic eruptions and other natural phenomena, and their mitigation.

It is a way of thinking, a disciplined and logical approach to problem solving that will be of interest to people who enjoy mathematics either for its inherent interest or as a method of problem solving in related disciplines.

Mathematics is growing today more than ever before—both as a subject in its own right and in terms of its influence on science, engineering and business. Some of the more recent advances in physics, chemistry and biology use mathematical concepts. The divisions of science that previously used few, if any, mathematical skills are now putting more and more emphasis on mathematical reasoning and techniques. Statistics, which is an area of mathematics concerned with data analysis, is increasingly used in such

disciplines as psychology, sociology, business, and health studies.

Native Studies (BA)

Native Studies, which concerns the scholarly recognition of Native culture and Native peoples of North America, is a relatively new discipline in Canadian universities. Programs like this reflect the increasingly important position of Aboriginal people throughout Canada and the world.

We provide a basic understanding of just who the Indian, Métis and Inuit people are, and what their aspirations and achievements are. The discipline includes the study of current affairs, history, economics, politics, family, and spiritual life. You can also study the expressive aspects of Aboriginal cultures through art, music and literature, and the practical side of contemporary Aboriginal life in Canada, including government and education. Archaeology is also part of Native Studies, providing the early history of Aboriginal people in this region.

Can the existence of God be proven? Is the human mind immortal? What is the meaning of life? Are moral values relative or absolute? Can scientific and historical knowledge be objective? These are some of the questions you, as a philosophy student, will explore.

Philosophy attempts to provide critical, reflective and creative answers to some of the most fundamental questions we can ask about ourselves and the world around us. An important part of its task is to make these questions more precise—to clarify the issues involved, and to try to provide acceptable methods for answering them. No

part of philosophy's task, however, is to dictate answers—it is the journey that is important. In short, the study of philosophy develops skills that help us both to analyze and synthesize ideas.

Physics is the study of the fundamental laws of nature that govern the structure and behaviour of matter and energy from submicropscopic fundamental particles to the entire universe. It also provides the foundation on which rests much of the technological innovation in the modern world, from computers to fiber optics to magnetic resonance imaging (MRI). Physicists today make important contributions using both classical physics (computer simulation of pharmaceuticals, detection of planets around distant stars, gravitometric sensing of mineral resources), and modern physics (quantum computing, precise calibration of GPS systems, materials development, search for new fundamental particles) in theory and applications that affect our daily lives and shape our outlook for the future.

Physics is a basic science grounded in the scientific method with applications that permeate all other sciences, engineering and technology. Physics graduates are problem solvers, with well-developed skills that enable them to work on a wide variety of pure and/or applied

physical challenges in today's technology driven workplace.

Political Science (BA)

Political Science is concerned with the study of political actors, institutions and processes that affect our daily lives. A healthy democracy requires an understanding of how governments work, how decisions are made, and the input that we as ordinary citizens can have in shaping our community. At the same time, an understanding of political science also helps us understand the world around us, and some of the global events and forces that shape politics at the international level.

Courses range from the basic Introduction to Politics to more advanced options in Canadian government, Political Theory, and Provincial Politics. You may also choose to take courses in American, European or Russian Politics, as well as the politics of the Developing World. We also teach courses in Contemporary World Politics, Canadian Foreign Policy, the United Nations, and Strategies of Major Powers. If you are interested in criminal justice and law, we offer courses in

Judicial Administration, Constitutional and Criminal Law, and Judicial Process.

Psychology (BA or BSc)

Since psychological principles operate anywhere there are people, an understanding of these principles helps you make sense of why people behave as they do and, most importantly, how people learn.

Psychology is one of the largest departments at Brandon University and serves a large percentage of the student body. Each faculty member specializes in a particular area of psychology both for teaching and research purposes. A wide variety of psychology courses are available at Brandon University. These courses represent major topics that psychologists consider important to understand behavior. You may select areas of study that offer opportunities to carry out laboratory or field research under the supervision of a faculty member.

Psychology, like other sciences, has become dependent on the use of computer technology for the study of behaviour, artificial intelligence, and brain processes, so that students who are interested in computer applications will find many demands for their skills.





Religion (BA)

The study of religion is your opportunity to step back from one particular religion and observe all religions in context. You can make useful comparisons and contrasts of the many religious beliefs, practices, and organizations the world over. All religious phenomena are available for inspection, from prehistoric beginnings to contemporary expressions.

You will have an opportunity to explore

- Sacred texts from many religions
- The history of selected religions
- Philosophical implications of religious truthclaims
- Religious competition in an increasingly secular world
- The intersection between religion and politics
- The relationship between religion and gender
- In-depth investigation of a specific religion

The variety of courses offered in religion permit you to build a major that fits your interests. You might pursue how human cultures influence the expression of one or more religions. You can study the philosophical foundations of a particular religion (or a particular cluster of religions), or you can study a classical language in which sacred texts were written, such as Chinese, Hebrew, or Greek. You can even explore social, psychological and biological theories about why humans are a religious species. The emphasis of your study will be determined by your passions for this vast and fascinating aspect of our lives.

Rural and Community Studies (BA)

The Rural and Community Studies Program offers a multidisciplinary opportunity to examine

the implications of some of the changes rural society is currently experiencing. You will examine some of the problems these changes are creating for rural people, and gain an understanding of solutions being used and proposed.

Sociology (BA)

Brandon University's Department of Sociology prepares you for active participation in the world around you by involving you in study, discovery, accumulation, and dissemination of knowledge about societal and community processes, issues, problems and needs. You will learn about how and why human groups are as they are, and how sociologists conduct research, share their ideas with others and influence the communities we live in. Sociology students have an opportunity to study areas such as criminology, social problems, family life, rural and community development, deviant behavior, gender relations, social psychology, medicine and the sociology of health and illness.

The Department offers a wide variety of courses that will help you develop the practical skills needed to critically assess and understand society. These include courses that will offer you a general overview of the field of Sociology and what sociologists do as well as more advanced courses in research methods and theory that will help you hone your ability to systematically collect information and view that information from differing perspectives.

 Ethnographic Research: A number of our faculty members hold expertise in ethnographic

- and qualitative research. Our students have established a record of success in the use of ethnographic method in their own project/thesis research.

It equips students through a well-rounded education in art issues, ideas and histories of both Western and Aboriginal art. Visual arts courses accommodate both beginner and advanced levels of study. You begin with an overview of the contemporary art world and learn about the studio applications for the development of basic technical and interpretative skills. Continued development relies on a broad spectrum of art and visual culture knowledge.

Students pursuing the BFA must select a major in Painting, Ceramics, Aboriginal Art or Drawing.

Students who have completed the Web Design diploma program at Assiniboine Community College may select the Digital Media and Design major that includes two years advanced standing in the BFA.

If you are currently attending, or have graduated from, an accredited high school in Manitoba (with no 'M' or 'I' courses), you will be given a conditional letter of acceptance once we receive your university application, along with your grade 10 and 11 marks. You do not need to have graduated already to begin the application process—we will contact your high school in June to obtain your final marks.

Advanced Placement/ International Baccalaureate

Mature Admission

Canadian citizens or landed immigrants who do not meet the regular admission requirements are admitted on probation provided they are at least 21 years of age

Dual Credit Admission

Students who are currently in grade 12, have pre-registered or completed all compulsory courses for graduation, have an average of 80% on Grade 11 and Grade 12 courses and have a recommendation from their principal may be admitted as dual credit.

International Students

International students are required to supply proof of English proficiency if they are not residents of an exempted country. This is a mandatory requirement. The following are accepted:



English Language Requirement Waiver

The English Language Waiver at Brandon University is for Permanent and Landed students who have resided a minimum of ten consecutive years in Canada. The period of residency will be the time elapsed between the 'Landed on' date on the 'Record of Landing' document and the first day of class in the term the applicant intends to register. The 'Record of Landing' document must be submitted to the Admissions Office.

Permanent and Landed students who do not meet the required ten consecutive years in Canada will be required to submit an acceptable English language proficiency score as recognized by Brandon University.
