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



WAYS TO HELP PAY FOR SCHOOL

- **Be considered for a UVic scholarship:** Entrance scholarships of \$20,000, payable at \$5,000 per year, are awarded to academically outstanding international undergraduate students entering UVic. You will automatically be considered for these scholarships at the time of admission. Students continuing to study at UVic will be automatically considered for In-Course Scholarships based on their UVic grades.

- **Apply for a scholarship or loan through your home country:** Talk with your high school counsellor to find out about financial opportunities offered through your own country (eg. US students may receive financial assistance from US Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and UVic's FAFSA code is G08370. Visit www.fafsa.ed.gov for details).
- **Work on campus while you study:** Visit www.uvic.ca/safa for details about the Work Study Program, which connects students with part-time jobs on campus.
- **Work off campus with a Canadian company:** As an international student, you can work off campus while completing your studies.

You will also be eligible to obtain a work permit that will allow you to work in Canada for three years following graduation. For more information, visit www.cic.gc.ca.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS BY COUNTRY

The following qualifications are the minimum required for consideration for admission to first-year studies in the Faculties of Humanities or Social Sciences. Additional requirements and specific subject requirements may be needed, depending on the desired faculty and/or department.

Requirements are organized by country or region. If you are attending a high school that follows the Canadian curriculum, please visit www.uvic.ca/programreq for program requirements.

USA

The following requirements are the minimum for consideration for undergraduate admission to faculties with direct entry from secondary school. Please consult www.uvic.ca/calendar for admission requirements to those faculties/programs that require qualifying years or prerequisites.

Admission requirements:

- Completion of Grade 12 in an accredited high school
- Your reported Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) will be reviewed—the minimum required average is 3.00 on a 4.00 scale (if you do not meet this requirement you may submit your SAT scores and letters of reference for consideration)
- Applicants must meet the following subject requirements (Carnegie units or years):

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

UNITED KINGDOM AND COMMONWEALTH

- The General Certificate of Secondary Education (GCSE) and the Advanced Level Examinations (U.K. examining boards) OR The Cambridge Overseas School Certificate and The Cambridge Higher School Certificate.
- Standing must be obtained in at least five subjects of which two must be at the Advanced Level. The remainder may be any combination of AS or O level subjects. One of the five courses must be English.
- A minimum overall average of C is required on the best two academic A level subjects. A grade of E is not acceptable.
- Each A level subject completed with a grade of C or higher may be eligible to receive three units of transfer credit at the first or second year level to a maximum of 12 units.
- Note: Hong Kong GCE - grades of D and E are not acceptable. Two subjects at the Advanced Supplementary (AS) Level may be substituted for one subject at the Advanced Level or Principal Level.

TRANSFER STUDENTS

If you've completed university-level work at an accredited post-secondary institution, you may be eligible for admission at the second-year level or above, depending on faculty and department requirements and on the transferability of courses.

Only applicants who have attained a high level of academic achievement will be offered admission, regardless of year level.

INFORMATION FOR INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE AND ADVANCED PLACEMENT APPLICANTS

INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE (IB) APPLICANTS

As an IB student, you are recognized as having completed university level courses and can receive university course credit for IB courses, saving you time and money.

- **Full IB Diploma:** If you've successfully completed the International Baccalaureate Diploma with a minimum of 24 points, you will be considered for admission and could receive up to one full year of transfer credit. Your IB Diploma must include three subjects at the higher level and three subjects at the standard level.
- **IB Certificate:** If you've completed higher level subjects and received an IB Certificate, but haven't completed a full diploma, you could receive 3.0 units of university transfer credit for each higher level IB subject that you have completed with a grade of 4 or higher (except Chemistry where the minimum grade is 5).

IB students who have scored 32 points or better on the diploma will receive a minimum \$2,000 CDN scholarship to help jumpstart their university career.

COLLEGE BOARD ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP) APPLICANTS

If you've completed an Advanced Placement course and have received a grade of 4 or 5 on the corresponding Advanced Placement examination, you'll receive UVic transfer credit for specific courses. With a grade of 3, you'll be granted advanced standing only (meaning you can register into a higher level of course work but you will not receive transfer credit for a UVic course).

FOR BOTH PROGRAMS

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY FOR APPLICANTS WHOSE FIRST LANGUAGE IS NOT ENGLISH

If your first language is not English, you must demonstrate your language proficiency when applying to UVic. You can do so in a number of ways:

- Completion of four years of secondary and/or post-secondary education in which the primary language of instruction is English in one of the countries listed at www.uvic.ca/esl
- Completion of a recognized degree program from an accredited university in which the primary language of instruction is English, in one of the countries listed at www.uvic.ca/esl
- Completion of Grade 12 English or its equivalent in Canada with a mark of 86 per cent or higher within the last three years prior to admission
- A score of 86 per cent or higher on the BC Provincial Grade 12 English Examination within the last three years prior to admission
- Completion of 1.5 or more units of transfer credit for university-level English courses
- Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)* with a score of 233 or higher on the computerized version, or a score of 575 or higher on the paper test, or a score of 90 or higher on the internet-based test—with no less than 20 out of 30 in any of the reading, listening, writing or speaking sections
- Michigan English Language Assessment Battery (MELAB)* with a score of 90 or higher
- International English Language Testing System (Academic IELTS)* with a score of 7 or higher
- Canadian Academic English Language Assessment (CAEL)* with a score of 70, with no subtest result below 60
- University of Victoria University Admission Preparation Course (UAPC) with a score of 80 per cent or higher
- A score of Level 6 on the BC Language Proficiency Index (LPI)
- A score of 4 or higher on the Advanced Placement Exam in English Language and Composition

- A score of 4 or higher on IB Higher Level English
- Tests taken more than two years prior to application will not be considered.

** Tests taken more than two years prior to application will not be considered.*

CONDITIONAL ADMISSION FOR ESL STUDENTS

If you are unable to successfully demonstrate language proficiency, you may be offered conditional admission to UVic if you meet all other admission requirements for your faculty of interest and if you complete the University Admission Preparation Course Program (UAPC).

Before you can be considered for conditional admission to the Faculties of Humanities, Science or Social Sciences, you must take the following steps:

1. Apply for admission to UVic at www.uvic.ca and submit an application fee.
2. Submit a TOEFL score of at least 71 (Internet-based test), 197 (computer-based test), 530 (paper test) or an IELTS score of 5.5. Students already registered in UVic's UAPC, or ELPI level 290 or higher, do not need to submit a TOEFL or IELTS score.
3. Submit two official transcripts of all secondary and post-secondary education completed.

UVic will determine admission eligibility based on your grades and level of education completed prior to attending UVic.

UNDERGRADUATE ENGLISH REQUIREMENT (FOR ALL UVIC STUDENTS)

Here's a heads-up—all UVic undergraduate students must take a UVic English class or equivalent in order to graduate, unless they qualify for one of the exemptions listed at www.uvic.ca/english-requirement. If you are not exempt and plan to register for an English class, you must first take the Language Proficiency Index (LPI). Visit www.lpi.ubc.ca for test dates and locations.

HOW TO APPLY

International applicants should start the application process early. If possible, begin applying in November or December of the year prior to attending.

- STEP 1:** Pick a faculty and program. Visit www.uvic.ca and click on “Choose your program”.
- STEP 2:** Check the admission requirements for your faculty or program on page 15, 16 and 17 of this handbook or visit www.uvic.ca/programreq.
- STEP 3:** Choose a start date for your studies (September is the most popular, but you can also start some programs in January or in the summer).
- STEP 4:** Apply online at www.uvic.ca/apply (check deadlines on page 20 and 21). Follow the instructions, pay the application fee and provide additional material as requested. The Faculties of Business, Education, Fine Arts and Human and Social Development have additional requirements, such as questionnaires, auditions and portfolio submissions.
- STEP 5:** Arrange to have two (2) official copies (not photocopies) of all secondary and post-secondary transcripts sent directly from the issuing institution to the address that follows.

OTHER APPLICATIONS TO CONSIDER

If you want to live on campus, you must apply separately at www.uvic.ca/housing. As a first-year student coming to UVic directly from high school, you're guaranteed a spot in residence if you have:

- accepted an offer of admission to UVic and paid the acceptance deposit by June 30
- received your student ID number and completed the housing application by June 30.

Additionally, you must apply separately for scholarships and bursaries at www.uvic.ca/safa.

HOW TO APPLY FOR A STUDY VISA

If you are an international student (non-Canadian citizen or permanent resident), you will need a study permit in order to study at a Canadian university. You may also need a Temporary Residence Visa (visitors), which will be issued to you at the same time as your study permit. To apply for a study permit, please contact the nearest Canadian diplomatic post.

It is best to apply early as processing of a study permit usually takes one or two months but can sometimes take as long as six months. There is a processing charge of \$125 Canadian dollars for one person. There is no fee for a visa when it is issued with a study permit.

For more information, visit the website of Citizenship and Immigration Canada at www.cic.gc.ca. Please note that you cannot obtain a study permit if you are already in Canada; you will have to leave the country to apply for a permit at one of the Canadian Visa Offices abroad.

YOU MUST ARRANGE FOR MEDICAL INSURANCE

Please note that international students, staff and faculty are required to have proper medical insurance to access medical care during their stay in BC. You must apply to the BC Medical Plan once you have lived in BC for three months but until then, you must purchase emergency health insurance. The extended health insurance included in your student fees does NOT cover the required emergency or provincial plans. AFTER YOU APPLY

- If you applied online, you will receive your UVic student number by email within a few days.
- If you submitted a paper application, you will receive your UVic student number via email at a later date.
- You will also receive a letter providing you with an admissions contact, information regarding the completion of your application process, and instructions on how to check your application status online.
